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**Abstract**

Comments on the findings of evaluation studies on the Fort Bragg Child and Adolescent Mental Health Demonstration (CAMHD; see records 13220, 13242, 13223, 13226, 13248, 13243, 13272, 13235, 13221), and implications for changes in policy and practice. The evaluations indicate that the system of care approach creates an expanded and organized network of service providers, which has a positive impact on service delivery. The lack of difference in outcomes between the CAMHD and comparison sites shows that the use of community-based services does not compromise the impact of treatment. Additional costs at the CAMHD are attributable to improved access to services and greater number of services. However, further information is required on the costs and outcomes of the service system.
